# Criminal Justice

A Master's Degree in Criminal Justice from CSU Stanislaus can accelerate your career to the next level. In addition to enhancing your qualifications for supervisory positions in law enforcement, investigations and corrections, a master's degree in Criminal Justice can also qualify you to teach at the postsecondary level, or to conduct training for local, state, and federal criminal justice agencies.

### Careers in Criminal Justice

- The continued growth of the Department of Homeland Security has led to a greater need for qualified criminal justice administrators and instructors.
- A master's degree can improve your chances for promotion, open doors to leadership positions, and qualify you to teach criminal justice in a variety of academic settings.
- An advanced degree will enhance your qualifications for supervisory positions in law enforcement, investigations, and corrections.
- **Bottom Line:** You'll be better prepared for the future as law enforcement agencies are increasingly placing greater emphasis on education.

### Program Overview

Designed for working adults who need maximum scheduling flexibility, the Criminal Justice M.A. at CSU Stanislaus provides an intensive study of theory and practice in the field of criminal justice. The program fosters independent learning and enables students to contribute intellectually to the corrections, law enforcement, and administration of justice professions.

Small class sizes mean maximum access to your instructors. In this effective setting, students learn to manage components of the criminal justice system through coursework in areas such as correctional systems; law enforcement; court systems; criminal justice and criminology theory; domestic violence; gender, race, and crime; constitutional law; criminal justice research; and management and leadership in criminal justice.

Most students complete the program in just two years. You will graduate with a full understanding of advanced criminal justice systems that will enable you to critically analyze and solve problems based on applied research methods. If you currently work in the criminal justice system, or want to enter this challenging and rewarding field, and have a bachelor's degree, this program is designed to meet your needs.

**Application to a graduate program at CSU Stanislaus is done in two parts: Students must apply both to the Graduate School and to the individual graduate program.**

**Qualified individuals holding a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university may apply to the Graduate School. Each applicant must submit the following Directly to the Graduate School office:**

- Official transcripts from each college or university attended. International students must have transcripts evaluated by an approved institution.

## Program Admission Requirements

- Completion of a bachelor's degree at an accredited college or university
- At least 15 undergraduate units in criminal justice, criminology, and/or related discipline as approved by the program director
- An undergraduate GPA of 3.0
- A grade of B or better in an upper-division research and methodology course
- Three letters of reference
- Letter of intent
- Writing sample
