
## Conference on the United Nation's Universal Declaration of Human Rights in Contemporary Perspective

In light of the numerous human rights challenges posed by institutional responses to migration, deportation, asylum-seekers and the rights claims of indigenous peoples within our own borders, featured conference talks will place this landmark declaration and several follow-up conventions in contemporary perspective by exploring how various human rights provisions should be applied to vulnerable, exploitable, expendable populations in today's world.



As one of many events worldwide calling attention to the 70th anniversary of the UN's Universal Declaration of Human Rights – and the status and contemporary relevance of important followup conventions and declarations relating to the human rights of refugees, migrant farmworkers and their families, discrimination against women, indigenous rights, and the rights of children – this conference will focus explicitly on contemporary issues relating to the human rights of migrants, indigenous peoples, children and other vulnerable groups, including women, offenders, asylum seekers, and those living in extreme poverty both within and beyond our borders.
