It is the mission of the Federal Bureau of Prisons to protect society by confining offenders in the controlled environments of prison and community-based facilities that are safe, humane, cost-efficient, and appropriately secure, and that provide work and other self-improvement opportunities to assist offenders in becoming law-abiding citizens.

FCC Forrest City

FCC Forrest City is the first Federal Prison in the State of Arkansas. The Federal Correctional Complex houses male offenders committed by United States District Courts and is comprised of the following facilities: The Minimum and Low security level facility is currently housing 2000 male offenders. The medium security level facility was activated in 2004 and is currently housing 1800 male offenders.

The Federal Correctional Complex Forrest City is located 45 miles west of Memphis, Tennessee; 89 miles east of Little Rock, Arkansas; and 55 miles south of Jonesboro, Arkansas, Set on the western edge of Crowley's Ridge, Forrest City, dubbed "Jewel of the Delta", gives you the best of two worlds. On one hand there's a friendly, small town atmosphere and low cost of living. On the other hand you have easy access to the cosmopolitan offerings of nearby Memphis, Little Rock, and Jonesboro. Forrest City is the largest of ten municipalities of St. Francis County located in North East Arkansas. St. Francis County was originally recognized by the Arkansas Territorial Legislature in October 1827. The county was named after the St. Francis River, a major Route for pioneer traffic. Forrest City was founded in 1866 when the railroad from Memphis to Little Rock was cut through Crowley's Ridge. Cherokee Indians lived on Crowley's Ridge beside a clear stream known as Village Creek. The area where the Indians settled is now the largest state park in Arkansas, Village Creek State Park. Outdoor recreation opportunities are superb with excellent fishing, hunting, camping, boating and golfing. If you want a break from small-town life. Memphis. Little Rock and Jonesboro are close by with fine dining, world renowned Bar-B-Q, opera, symphony, live theater, museums and zoos. Southland Greyhound Park in West Memphis offers daily races and several casinos are located on the Mississippi River just south of Memphis in Tunica, Mississippi. Come discover the friendly people, the hometown pride and other qualities which make Forrest City a great place to live, work, and play.

About Us:

The Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP) is composed of a diverse group of more than 37,000 career minded individuals which make up what is often referred to as the "bureau family". The BOP continues to have growth and has more than 118 facilities across the country to include Hawaii and Puerto Rico. We encourage you to explore our website at www.bop.gov and consider a career with our agency.

Qualifications:

The largest percentage of our staff are Correctional Officers and to qualify for this position you must have completed at least one of the following: A full 4 year course of study in any field leading to a Bachelor's Degree by an accredited institution, a Bachelor's Degree, or the equivalent of at least 3 years of full time general experience performing duties such as guidance, counseling, emergency response, supervising, management, teaching, or sales. Pertinent volunteer experience is also acceptable.

Age:

At the time of appointment applicants must not have reached their 37th birthday. The age requirement can be waived for Veterans, Psychologists, Chaplains, and most medical positions.

Salary:

Salaries are based on the position and location of the job you are selected to fill. The Law Enforcement Special Salary Rate and Locality pay scale may vary from the General Schedule and Locality pay scale.

Leave:

All full time employees earn 13 days of sick leave per year. There are also 10 paid Federal Government holidays each calendar year. Vacation or Annual Leave is earned in increments of 4, 6, or 8 hours per two week pay period based on the number of years of Federal service.

Insurance:

There are a variety of health insurance options available to Federal employees and the Government pays anywhere from 60 to 72 percent of the cost

depending on the health plan you select. A basic life insurance plan is automatic and is effective for new employees on day one. There are optional life insurance policies that are also available for purchase.

Retirement:

An employee may retire at the age of 50 after 20 years of service or at any age after 25 years of service.

Thrift Savings Plan:

The purpose of TSP is to provide retirement income. TSP offers Federal civilian employees the same type of savings and tax benefits that many private corporations offer their employees under "401K" plans.

APPLICATION STEPS - APPLYING FOR A JOB AT THE FEDERAL BUREAU OF PRISONS

STEP 1: Research the Job Opportunities

Is the Federal Bureau of Prisons right for you? The information presented on this website should help you decide, and we encourage all potential applicants to browse our site to learn more about the BOP and available career opportunities.

Applicants for Correctional Officer, Clinical Psychologist, Dental Officer, Medical Officer, Nurse Practitioner, Physician Assistant, and Registered Nurse can click on the job title above for more information on each and apply online at USAJOBS. These positions are open continuously and you can apply at any time. Follow the on-screen instructions to register with USAJOBS. After you register, you will be able to view vacancies and apply online.

Applicants for all other BOP job opportunities, i.e., Information Technology, Administrative, and all other positions not listed above, must use the USAJOBS website to search for current vacancies within the Bureau of Prisons. The search can be limited by location, series, and/or job title. Please note, you may also find some vacancy announcements for continuously open positions listed on USAJOBS.

STEP 2: Read the Vacancy Announcement and Obtain Your Forms

Once you have found a job opportunity that interests you using STEP 1, you will need more information on the specific opportunity and appropriate application forms. Use USAJOBS to obtain a copy of the vacancy announcement. Most of the questions you have will be answered as you read through the announcement. STEP 3: Follow the Application Instructions

BOP: Application Steps - Applying For a Job

Use USAJOBS to apply online for the BOP's open continuous positions listed in Step 1.

All other jobs, unless an online application is specified, require that applicants submit a written application form. Applicants may submit a resume or the Optional Application Form for Federal Employment, OF-612, which can be easily downloaded in either Word or PDF (Adobe) format at http://www.opm.aov/forms/html/of.as p. We also have the OF-612 in WordPerfect9 format.

Whatever application method is required, it is essential that you follow the instructions given in the vacancy announcement and that your application contains the following:

Job Information: Announcement number, title, and grade.

Personal information: Full name, mailing address, day and evening phone numbers, and social security number.

Education: High school name, city, and state; names of colleges or universities, city, and state, majors, and type and year of any degrees received.

Work Experience: Job title, duties and accomplishments, employer's name and address, supervisor's name and phone number, starting and ending dates, hours worked per week, and salary.

Other Qualifications: Job-related training courses (title and year), job-related skills, job-related certifications and licenses, and job-related honors and awards.

Current Federal Employees: If you are currently a Federal employee, include a copy of your most recent performance appraisal that reflects performance in a job related to the job for which you are applying. In addition, if you are applying for a vacancy based on your competitive status or eligibility for reinstatement to competitive Federal service, you must include your "Notification of Personnel Action" (SF-50), which verifies that you are a career or career conditional employee in competitive service or verifies that you are eligible for reinstatement to the competitive service.
