POSITION:

LECTURER IN POLITICAL SCIENCE. Housed in the Department of Political Science and Public Administration, the Political Science program has an immediate opening for a part-time Lecturer to teach upper-division political theory courses: Ancient and Medieval Political Thought (PSCI 3000) and American Political Thought (PSCI 3030) in Fall 2019 and Political Thought in the Modern World (PSCI 3011) and Political Ideologies (PSCI 4050) in Spring 2020. The Fall Semester courses are both hybrid delivery (Two 50 minute face-to-face meetings and one online meeting per week). Sections of American Government (PSCI 1201) may also be available in both semesters. The department anticipates an on-going need for part-time instructors to teach American Government and other courses in Political Science, including *Introduction to Political Science* (PSCI 2000) and *Comparative Politics: Latin America* (PSCI 3410). Applicants interested in being considered for one or more of these course assignments should address relevant qualifications in the application letter.

MA in Political Science, or Master of Public Administration with a BA in Political Science.

**PREFERRED
QUALIFICATIONS:**

ABD or PhD in Political Science with an appropriate specialization in Political Theory. Successful and effective college-level teaching experience. Strong academic accomplishment in a Political Science or Public Administration graduate program.

& DEADLINE:**

A complete application is required and must include the following: cover letter specifically addressing your qualifications for the position; unofficial copies of graduate transcripts; a professional CV, including contact information for three references; and teaching evaluations or documentation of teaching effectiveness in a college or university setting. Official transcripts will be required at the time of hire. Screening of application files will commence immediately. Applications will be accepted until all available courses have been assigned.

CRIMINAL BACKGROUND CLEARANCE NOTICE

The university requires a criminal and/or child abuse background check to be completed for many of its new employees, current employees seeking promotional or transfer opportunities, and current employees assigned new duties. Satisfactory completion of a background check (including a criminal records check) is required for employment. CSU will make a conditional offer of employment, which may be rescinded if the background check reveals disqualifying information, and/or it is discovered that the candidate knowingly withheld or falsified information. Failure to satisfactorily complete the background check may affect the continued employment of a current CSU employee who was conditionally offered the position. Failure to consent to any background check will disqualify an applicant from further consideration. Additionally, an applicant who fails to provide the necessary information or who provides false or misleading information may also be disqualified from further consideration. Later discovery of false or misleading information related to the background check may result in the offer of employment being withdrawn or subject the employee to disciplinary action, up to and including termination.
