### I WILL LEAD BY EXAMPLE

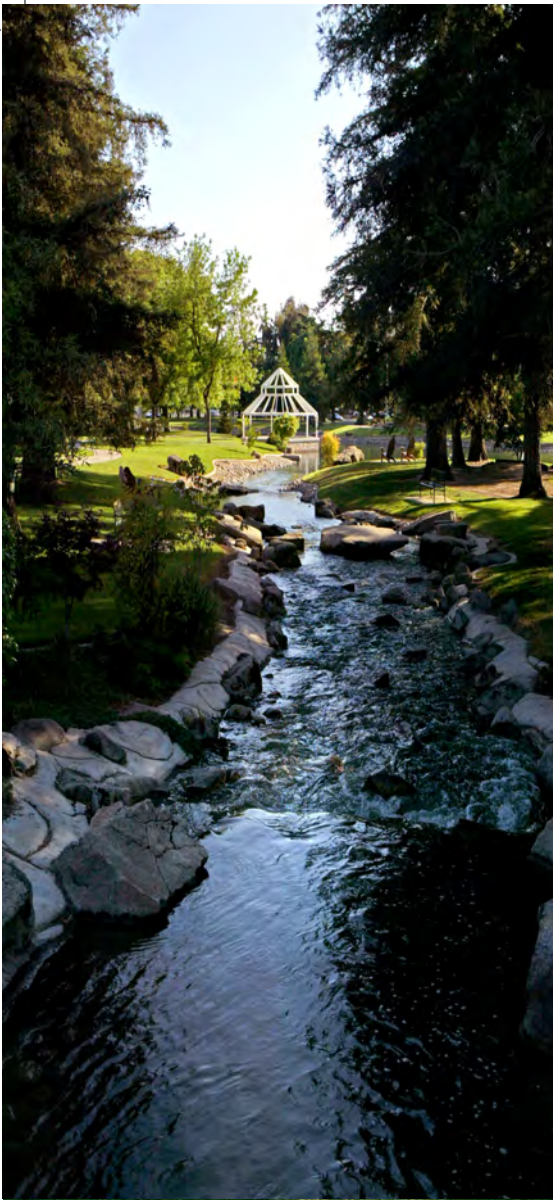
As the university's future upperclassmen, we play a major role in influencing the generations that succeed us. Our involvement in campus traditions and devotion to academics will set a precedence for future students.

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### Our Name

The institution moved to its current location in 1965, gained university status and its present name, California State University, Stanislaus, in 1986. The Stockton Campus opened in 1998. The University is often fondly referred to as Stan State.

# DEVELOP A PLAN NOW TO GRADUATE

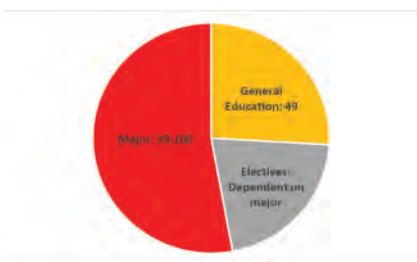


What do you want to study? What fuels your passion? Stanislaus State offers many undergraduate and graduate academic programs. Several of our majors are divided into areas of specialization as options. You may also choose from a wide variety of minors, teaching credentials, certificates, and graduate programs.

## PLAN YOUR DEGREE

There are three basic types of courses that make up your degree:

1. General Education Courses—48 units required for all students.
2. Major Courses—the number of courses varies by major.
3. Elective Courses—additional courses you need to fulfill the total number of units needed to graduate (120-128).

## The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA)

FERPA is a federal law regarding the privacy of student records and the obligations of the institution, primarily in the areas of release of the records and the access provided to these records. Education records include academic, financial, health and student conduct records. This information is protected under FERPA, and parents may not have access unless the student has provided authorization that specifically identifies what information may be released to the parent(s).

## GENERAL EDUCATION

You must complete 49 units (16 courses) of GE course work. Some of this GE coursework can also “double-count” toward major and graduation requirements.

## GOLDEN FOUR

Basic skills courses which includes four courses:

- (A1) Oral Communication
- (A2) Written Communication
- (A3) Critical Thinking
- (A4) Mathematics/Quantitative Reasoning

Please note: These courses must be completed with a C- or better. We recommend you complete these courses early in your college career as they serve as building blocks to later course work.

### TIP:

**To graduate in four years, you must complete 30 units a year.**

# **UNDERSTANDING YOUR GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS**

The eight graduation requirements break down the individual components required to earn a bachelor's degree from Stanislaus State and help you monitor your academic progress.

Once you declare a major, your Degree Progress Report found in your Student Center on MyStanState Portal outlines all degree requirements and is a great way to track your progress towards graduation!



## GETTING A BACHELOR'S DEGREE:

### THE EIGHT GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

#### 1. Units & Residency

- Earn at least 120 academic units (some majors require more units).
- You must complete a minimum of 30 units in residence at CSU, Stanislaus. At least 24 of the 30 units must be upper division coursework, 12 must be in the major, and 9 must be applicable to GE Breadth requirements.
- A maximum of 70 semester units from community colleges may be applied to the total units.
- Unit load: to be considered a full-time student for Financial Aid eligibility, you must take at least 12 units per semester. However, to graduate in four years, you must average 30 units a year.

**Tip:** Talk with advisors about what is an appropriate course load for you factoring in your study habits, work schedule and other time restraints.

#### 2. Grade Point Average

- You must complete with a minimum GPA of 2.0 (C) or better, which includes all acceptable college units attempted, major field of study, academic minor, and residence credit units.

**Tip:** Some majors may have additional grade point average requirements.

#### 3. General Education (GE)

- Complete 49 units of GE coursework as outlined in the Academic Catalog.

#### 4. Upper Division Writing Proficiency

- In addition to satisfactory completion of all General Education Communication Skills requirements, all students must demonstrate competency in writing skills as a requirement for graduation.

#### 5. US Constitution and California State and Local Government

- You must satisfy subject requirements in US History, Constitution, and California State and Local Government by passing the Challenge Exam or taking PSCI 1201 - American Government.

#### 6. Multicultural Requirement

- You must complete three units of the following coursework that addresses multicultural, ethnic studies, gender, or nonwestern cultures issues.

**Tip:** Consult with advisors on ways to “double-count” these courses in GE.

#### 7. Graduation Application

- You should submit an Application for Graduation when two semesters remain to complete requirements for the degree and when 90 units have been completed.

#### 8. Graduation Approval

- Approval of the major adviser, department chair, and the Director of Academic Advising is required before the University may award a degree.

#### TIP:

To guide you toward completing all the requirements for your degree, you can use a Degree Map (Major Academic Plan).

Your MAP illustrates an efficient path toward completing your degree, but it is not set in stone. Most GE courses are interchangeable throughout the various semesters, MAPS are available online on the University Catalog.

## ACADEMIC TERMS, GRADING, & SYMBOLS

**College:** An administrative office that coordinates the activities of several academic departments. There are four Colleges at Stanislaus State.

- College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences
- College of Business
- College of Education, Kinesiology and Social Work
- College of Science

**Hold:** A restriction preventing you from enrolling in courses or making adjustments to an existing schedule of courses. Holds are placed on your account for not fulfilling University requirements or deadlines (e.g., failure to pay fees or submitting transcripts) or due to University policy (e.g., Mandatory Advising or declaring a major by 60 units). View your current holds (if any) on the Student Center page of your MyStanState account.

### Credit/No Credit (CR/NC):

Students may elect to be graded on a Credit/No Credit basis in any general education course approved with that grading option. A grade of CR or NC has no effect on your GPA. No more than 24 Stanislaus State CR semester units may be applied toward a baccalaureate degree.

**W (Withdrawal):** Issued when a student drops a class with appropriate approval after the fourth week of the semester and it does not impact the GPA. Undergraduate students are limited to 18 units of (W) grades.

**WU (Withdrawal Unauthorized):** Issued when a student stops attending a class without properly dropping or withdrawing from it. A (WU) computes in the GPA as 0 points, similar to an (F) grade.

**I (Incomplete):** Used in cases where course requirements cannot be met for unforeseen reasons and assigned at the discretion of the instructor. Students must work with the instructor to complete remaining work. An I grade must be made up within one calendar year after it is assigned by the faculty member.

### Grade Point Average (GPA):

- **Term GPA:** Grades earned in a specific semester.
- **Stanislaus State GPA:** All courses taken at Stanislaus State.
- **Overall GPA:** All college courses taken including those from other colleges/universities.
- **Dean's List:** Compiled every semester by each college of students who earn a 3.5 GPA or better on 12 or more graded units the previous semester.

# **UNDERSTANDING OUR ACADEMIC POLICIES**

We have policies in place to support you in your educational journey. As a Stanislaus State student, you're responsible for knowing what's expected to meet your degree requirements and for seeking academic advising along the way. ## KEY ACADEMIC POLICIES

**Academic Honesty:** Students are expected to maintain a high standard of academic honesty and integrity. Dishonesty may bring grade reduction, disciplinary probation, suspension or expulsion. Details are outlined in the Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities. The Student Conduct office charged with handling such cases. It is also a resource for students who believe they have been discriminated against or treated unfairly.

**Leave of Absence:** Students who do not enroll at least part-time for one semester each calendar year risk the loss of rights to their original catalog year graduation requirements. A Leave of Absence is a temporary leave from the university, which may be necessary during your academic career. This leave ensures that your program of study and access to many University services remain active.

### Declaration or Change of Degree

**Objective:** Declaring or changing a major is an important decision. We advise taking exploratory courses and visiting with staff in the Academic Success Center to help you decide. It is recommended that you declare or change your major before completing 60 units of academic coursework.

### Repeated Courses

Students may repeat courses (a maximum of 28 units) if the earlier attempt resulted in a grade of “C–” or lower or “no credit.”

Students may repeat a course “with forgiveness” for courses taken at Stanislaus State (a maximum of 16 units). Forgiveness means the previous letter grade is removed from the GPA computation. Students wishing to repeat a course should meet with an Academic Advisor.

**Academic Probation:** A student will be placed under academic probation anytime their cumulative or CSU Stanislaus grade point average (GPA) falls below a 2.0.

### Academic Disqualification &

**Reinstatement:** Students will be disqualified from the University when as:

1. A First Year/Freshman (0-30 units completed), your GPA falls below 1.5 on all units attempted or on all units attempted at Stanislaus State.
2. A Sophomore (31 to 59 units completed), your GPA falls below 1.85 on all units.
3. A Junior (60 to 89 units completed), your GPA falls below 1.85 on all units attempted or on all units attempted at Stanislaus State.
4. A Senior (90 or more units completed), your GPA falls below 1.95 on all units attempted or on all units attempted at Stanislaus State.

A student seeking reinstatement must complete a Reinstatement Petition and provide any documentation necessary to prove an improved GPA to the Academic Success Center during advising hours. An ASC advisor must meet with the student and review the documentation before the petition can be submitted. A student who has not been enrolled at the University for one year or who have matriculated at another institution since last attending Stanislaus State must also apply for readmission, following established dates and deadlines, in order to be reinstated.

**Classification by Class Level:** Your class level is determined by the number of units you’ve completed.

- First Year: completed 0–29 units
- Sophomore: completed 30–59 units
- Junior: completed 60–89 units
- Senior: completed 90 or more units

You get support from both Academic Advising Programs as well as your major academic department. We encourage you to visit your academic advisors early and often (at least once a semester) and some departments require mandatory major advising.

### Academic Advising

### STAN Planner

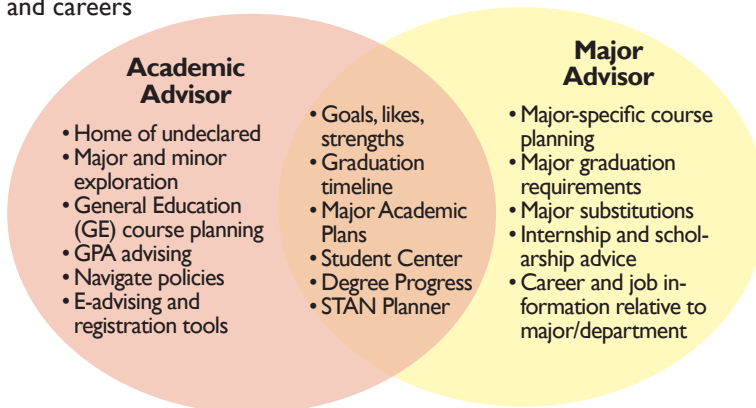

Advisors are available for currently attending or returning Stanislaus State undergraduates. We can help with general education, graduation requirements, academic disqualification and reinstatement. The Academic Success Center advises all undeclared and pre-nursing students.

Advising and mentorship is available to previously incarcerated students. Must be a current Stan State student or interested in transferring to Stan State.



## **Stan Planner**

STAN Planner is an interactive tool available in myStanState to help students be more proactive with their course planning.



## **Stan Degree Planner**

STAN Degree Progress tracks which graduation requirements have been satisfied and which requirements still must be completed.



## **Stan Scheduler**

STAN Scheduler allows students to create and compare multiple class schedules for a semester based on course preferences as well as other commitments such as your work, sport and/or family schedules.

## TIME MANAGEMENT STRATEGIES

### 1. Consider your commitments:

- Use a weekly schedule worksheet. Divide it into one-hour blocks
- Fill in all of your commitments (classes, discussion periods, labs)
- Add other regular scheduled activities (parttime jobs, commuting time, athletics, etc.)

### 2. Blocks of study time and breaks:

- Develop and plan blocks of study time
- Determine which hours of the day are most efficient (50-minute blocks are ideal)
- Take frequent breaks
- Study the most challenging material first when you're fresh

### 3. Dedicated study spaces:

- Determine a place free from distraction (and friends) where you can maximize your concentration
- Turn off or put away your cell phone

### 4. Review notes and readings just before class:

- Write down 1 or 2 questions from readings
- Ask the questions in class; demonstrate to your instructor you are prepared

### 5. Weekly reviews:

- Review your assignments, notes, and calendar prior to the start of each week
- List deadlines and exam dates on your planner or your cell phone

### 6. Achieve “stage one”—get something done:

- Identify the first step to get the assignment started
- Roughly draft your idea. You will have time to edit and develop it later

### 7. Use your free time wisely:

- Identify times when you can study in “bits” (walking to school, riding the bus, in between classes, etc.)
- Review flash cards, or, if you can concentrate, read or review a chapter

### 8. Reward yourself:

- Ideally, schedule a six-day week to allow yourself a “free” day to do whatever you wish!
- Don't over-extend yourself
- Stick to a reasonable schedule
- Strive for balance in your life

### 9. Utilize your resources!

- Visit with the Academic Success Center, Learning Commons, and Psychological and Counseling Services.

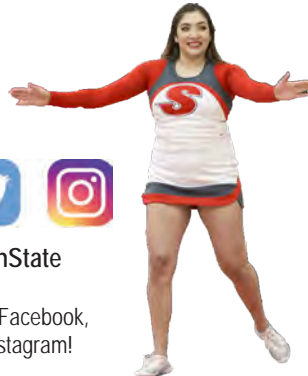

# Campus Resources

CAMPUS RESOURCES



## UNIVERSITY POLICE DEPARTMENT

The University Police Department (UPD) is the on-hand, 24-hours a day, 7-days a week police force serving the campus and immediate surrounding community. UPD is an IACLEA accredited police department with 12 fully-trained and sworn police officers on staff. UPD also employs 2 dispatchers, 5 non-sworn support staff, as well as numerous student assistants.

### StanAlert

StanAlert is an emergency notification system (ENS) capable of rapidly sending voice, email and text messages to faculty, staff, and students. Stanislaus State officials use StanAlert to convey timely information - including urgent safety instructions - during an emergency or major situation affecting the campus. ### Emergency Blue Light Phones

If you ever feel threatened on campus, these blue light phones ring directly to a 911 dispatcher. Please use these phones to report suspicious activity, fire, medical, or other emergencies. These phones are strategically located throughout the campus.

### Dispatch Services

UPD Dispatch/Communication Center is staffed with two P.O.S.T. certified police dispatchers as required by the State of California. One full time support staff, as well as student assistants, assist with reception, non-emergency phones, and more. In an emergency, always dial 9-1-1 to guarantee the line will be answered by a dispatcher with police radio access to expedite response time.

### Live Scan fingerprinting

The UPD provides Live Scan services and rolled ink fingerprints to students, staff and various businesses and institutions.

### Warrior Express Shuttle

UPD provides evening shuttles throughout campus for the protection of students after dark during the Fall and Spring semesters. Students, faculty, staff, and visitors may ride the Warrior Express shuttles for free. Text your location and destination to (209) 277- 8940 or call (209) 667-3114.

### Motorist Assistance

Car battery dead? Locked your keys in your car, perhaps? If you are parked on campus, wait by your vehicle and give UPD a call at (209) 667-3114. We can usually help, and it's free. We will need to know where your vehicle is parked along with the make, model, color, and license plate of your vehicle.

### Rape Aggression Defense (RAD)

A program designed to help women overcome the effects of sexual harassment and sexual violence on campus by teaching assertiveness, awareness, risk reduction, risk recognition, avoidance and physical defense strategies.





## STUDENT CONDUCT CODE: TITLE 5: California Code of Regulations

### § 41301. Standards for Student Conduct

#### (a) *Campus Community Values*

The University is committed to maintaining a safe and healthy living and learning environment for students, faculty, and staff. Each member of the campus community should choose behaviors that contribute toward this end. Students are expected to be good citizens and to engage in responsible behaviors that reflect well upon their university, to be civil to one another and to others in the campus community, and contribute positively to student and university life.

#### (b) *Grounds for Student Discipline*

Student behavior that is not consistent with the Student Conduct Code is addressed through an educational process that is designed to promote safety and good citizenship and, when necessary, impose appropriate consequences.

The following are the grounds upon which student discipline can be based:

(1) Dishonesty, including:

- (A) Cheating, plagiarism, or other forms of academic dishonesty that are intended to gain unfair academic advantage.
- (B) Furnishing false information to a University official, faculty member, or campus office.
- (C) Forgery, alteration, or misuse of a University document, key, or identification instrument.
- (D) Misrepresenting one's self to be an authorized agent of the University or one of its auxiliaries.

(2) Unauthorized entry into, presence in, use of, or misuse of University property.

(3) Willful, material and substantial disruption or obstruction of a University-related activity, or any on-campus activity.

(4) Participating in an activity that substantially and materially disrupts the normal operations of the university, or infringes on the rights of members of the University community.

(5) Willful, material and substantial obstruction of the free flow of pedestrian

or other traffic, on or leading to campus property or an off-campus University related activity.

(6) Disorderly, lewd, indecent, or obscene behavior at a University related activity, or directed toward a member of the University community.

(7) Conduct that threatens or endangers the health or safety of any person within or related to the University community, including physical abuse, threats, intimidation, harassment, or sexual misconduct.

(8) Hazing, or conspiracy to haze. Hazing is defined as any method of initiation or pre-initiation into a student organization or student body, whether or not the organization or body is officially recognized by an educational institution, which is likely to cause serious bodily injury to any former, current, or prospective student of any school, community college, college, university or other educational institution in this state (Penal Code 245.6), and in addition, any act likely to cause physical harm, personal degradation or disgrace resulting in physical or mental harm, to any former, current, or prospective student of any school, community college, college, university or other educational institution. The term "hazing" does not include customary athletic events or school sanctioned events.

Neither the express or implied consent of a victim of hazing, nor the lack of active participation in a particular hazing incident is a defense. Apathy or acquiescence in the presence of hazing is not a neutral act, and is also a violation of this section.

(9) Use, possession, manufacture, or distribution of illegal drugs or drug-related paraphernalia, (except as expressly permitted by law and University regulations) or the misuse of legal pharmaceutical drugs.

(10) Use, possession, manufacture, or distribution of alcoholic beverages (except as expressly permitted by law and University regulations), or public intoxication while on campus or at a University related activity.

(11) Theft of property or services from the University community, or misappropriation of University resources.

(12) Unauthorized destruction, or damage to University property or other property in the University community.

(13) Possession or misuse of firearms or guns, replicas, ammunition, explosives, fireworks, knives, other weapons, or dangerous chemicals (without the prior authorization of the campus president) on campus or at a University related activity.

(14) Unauthorized recording, dissemination, or publication of academic presentations (including handwritten notes) for a commercial purpose.

(15) Misuse of computer facilities or resources, including

(A) Unauthorized entry into a file, for any purpose.

(B) Unauthorized transfer of a file.

(C) Use of another's identification or password.

(D) Use of computing facilities, campus network, or other resources to interfere with the work of another member of the University community.

(E) Use of computing facilities and resources to send obscene or intimidating and abusive messages.

(F) Use of computing facilities and resources to interfere with normal University operations.

(G) Use of computing facilities and resources in violation of copyright laws.

(H) Violation of a campus computer use policy.

(16) Violation of any published University policy, rule, regulation or presidential order.

(17) Failure to comply with directions or, or interference with, any University official or any public safety officer while acting in the performance of his/her duties.

(18) Any act chargeable as a violation of a federal, state, or local law that poses a substantial threat to the safety or well being of members of the University community, to property within the University community or poses a significant threat of disruption or interference with University operations.

(19) Violation of the Student Conduct Procedures, including

(A) Falsification, distortion, or misrepresentation of information related to a student discipline matter.

(B) Disruption or interference with the orderly progress of a student discipline proceeding.

(C) Initiation of a student discipline proceeding in bad faith.

(D) Attempting to discourage another from participating in the student discipline matter.

(E) Attempting to influence the impartiality of any participant in a student discipline matter.

(F) Verbal or physical harassment or intimidation of any participant in a student discipline matter.

(G) Failure to comply with the sanction(s) imposed under a student discipline proceeding.

(20) Encouraging, permitting, or assisting another to do any act that could subject him or her to discipline.

#### (c) **Procedures for Enforcing This Code**

The Chancellor shall adopt procedures to ensure students are afforded appropriate notice and an opportunity to be heard before the University imposes any sanction for a violation of the Student Conduct Code.

(d) Application of This Code  
Sanction for the conduct listed above can be imposed on applicants, enrolled students, students between academic terms, graduates awaiting degrees, and students who withdraw from school while a disciplinary matter is pending. Conduct that threatens the safety or security of the campus community, or substantially disrupts the functions or operation of the University is within the jurisdiction of this Article regardless of whether it occurs on or off campus. Nothing in this Code may conflict with Education Code Section 66301 that prohibits disciplinary action against students based on behavior protected by the First Amendment.

Note: Authority cited: Sections 66017, 66452, 66600, 69810, 89030 and 89035, Education Code. Reference: Sections 66450, 69813 et seq. and 89030, Education Code.

## **Equal Opportunity: Policies Prohibiting Discrimination, Harassment, Sexual Misconduct, and Retaliation**

The CSU values and embraces our community differences in Age, Disability (physical and mental), Gender (or sex), Gender Identity (including transgender), Gender Expression, Genetic Information, Marital Status, Medical Condition, Nationality, Race or Ethnicity, Religion (or religious creed), Sexual Orientation, Veteran or Military Status. All students have the right to participate fully in CSU programs and activities, including Stanislaus State student organizations, free from Discrimination, Harassment, Sexual Misconduct, Sexual Exploitation, Dating/Domestic Violence, Stalking, or Retaliation. The CSU prohibits retaliation against any individual who makes a complaint of discrimination or sexual misconduct or otherwise engaged in protected activity like participating in an investigation.

Discrimination and sexual misconduct have impacts across contexts during a university experience, even to a student organization. Student organizations are encouraged to create a culture of prevention, response, and restoration.

### **Preventing Sexual Misconduct**

Sexual misconduct prevention requires an awareness of harmful behaviors that make up sexual misconduct, in addition to understanding the underlying social and cultural norms that allow sexual misconduct to persist within our communities. There are ways every student organization can help contribute towards preventing sexual misconduct and supporting survivors. Student organizations should discuss preventing sexual misconduct with their membership, consider inviting the University's Haven Educator to facilitate a prevention workshop.

Sexual activity requires affirmative consent. Engaging in any sexual activity without first obtaining affirmative consent to the specific physical contact is considered sexual misconduct, whether or not the conduct violates any civil or criminal law(s). Silence or submission is not consent. An incapacitated person (for example, a person intoxicated by drugs or alcohol) cannot consent. Using force, coercion, threats, alcohol, or other drugs to facilitate sexual activity can lead to disciplinary action and criminal or civil action against an individual. Remember "no" means "No!" and "stop" means "Stop!"

### **Reporting Discrimination or Sexual Misconduct including Sexual Assault:**

Members of the University community who experience discrimination or sexual misconduct, witnesses, or concerned individuals may report to the University.

Reports can be made by:

1. anonymously using the Incident Reporting Form at [www.csustan.edu/stancares](http://www.csustan.edu/stancares);
2. contacting the Title IX and D/H/R Administrators [Julie Johnson](#) or [Paul Norris](#); or
3. contacting the University Police Department.

Please be aware the University cannot provide supportive services, including academic accommodations, or address the situation if the Title IX and D/H/R Administrators are not aware of the misconduct.

## **Amnesty for Complainants and Witnesses:**

. To encourage good faith reporting, complainants or witnesses will not be subject to discipline for possible student conduct, such as underage drinking, at or near the time of the alleged misconduct unless the violation is egregious.

It is in the best interests of our community that students report possible harmful acts to university officials, and witnesses come forward to share what they know.

Across college campuses nationwide, students are reporting that they are struggling to meet their basic needs while balancing their academic journey. The Stanislaus State community has come together to address barriers to student success both inside and outside the classroom, including food and housing insecurity. This is demonstrated through the various Basic Needs services and resources that are available to support students. Such resources include: Campus Cares, the Warrior Food Pantry, CalFresh application assistance and the Food Distribution program.

## CAMPUS CARES

Campus Cares is a program designed to provide support to currently enrolled Stanislaus State students who are struggling with a personal crisis or an emergency situation. For some students, the financial impact of a fire, temporary homelessness, an injury or loss of a family member could drastically affect their success. The Campus Cares services include short-term emergency housing, emergency grants, connection to community resources and more.



The Warrior Food Pantry provides non-perishable food items and toiletries at no cost to Stan State students. The pantry aims to decrease the impact that food insecurities have on the academic success of students, as well as helps to alleviate hunger within our campus community.

CalFresh is a nutrition assistance program that helps individuals and families buy healthy foods. A Basic Needs Coordinator can assist students with the CalFresh application. If eligible, students can receive money each month for groceries.

Food Distributions are held twice a month and made possible by the generous support from the California Faculty Association (CFA), Warrior Food Pantry and the United Samaritans Foundation.

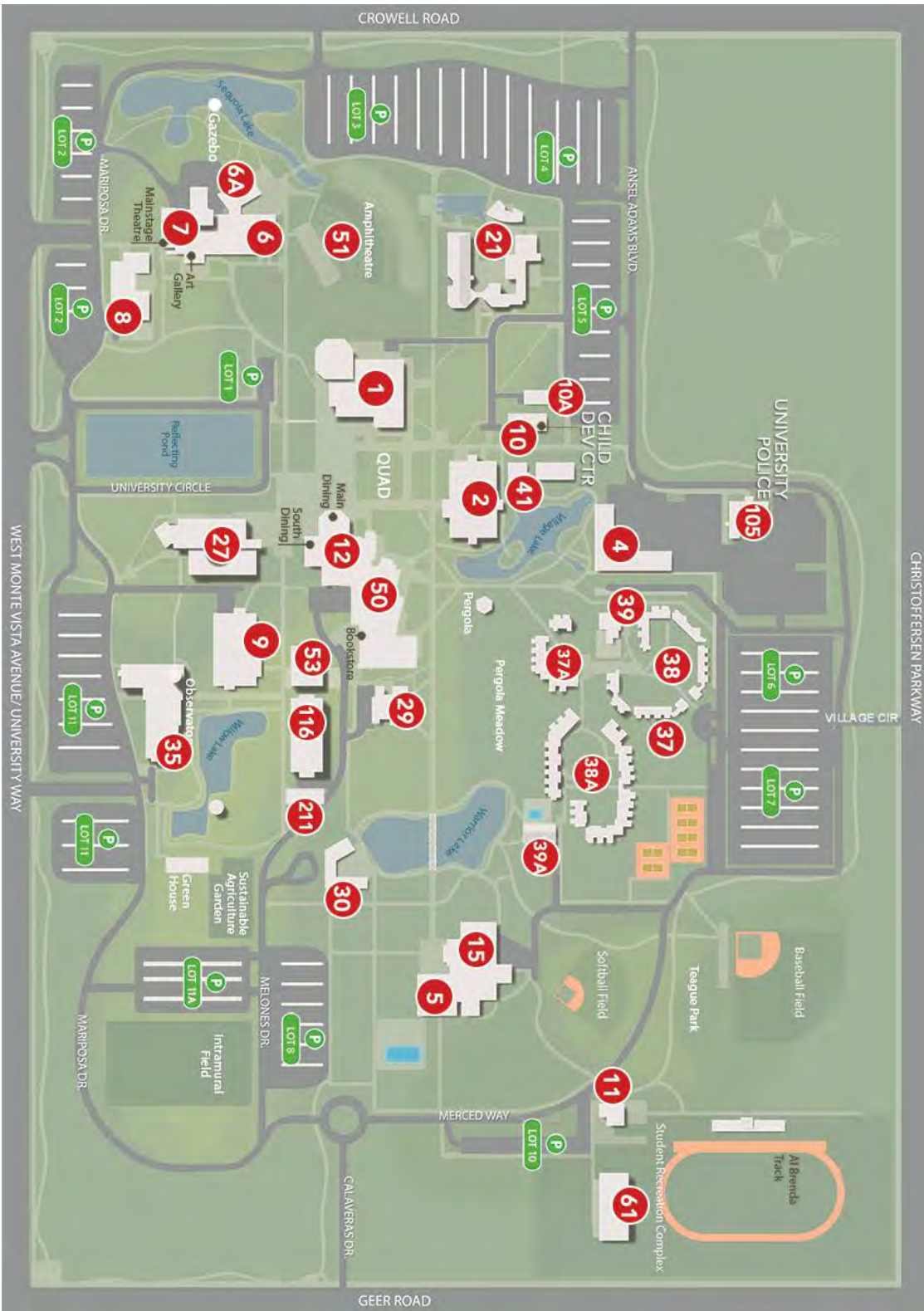
